Retrofit and Decommodify housing Collectively, and in Solidarity

What is this for?

- RAD Housing is one possible approach to collectivising housing
- Suited to a group of people with a range of income levels and available capital to work together.
- It's a transitional model based on current conditions, ideally everyone should just be housed.

Retrofitting suburban housing Suburbia is far from perfect, but we already built it

- We are in a climate crisis
- Australia's existing buildings emitted 1804 million tonnes of CO₂, and consumed massive amounts of energy and water when built.
- Construction industry is 37% of global emissions
- Timing on decarbonisation is critical
- New builds can lead to gentrification and displacement
- Retrofitting provides lots of meaningful work with less highly specialised skills





Decommodify housing ownership Housing should be for everyone

- We are in a housing crisis
- The "great Australian dream" has powered one of the most overcooked housing markets on the planet
- Housing as a speculative financial commodity drives inequality and gives power to banks and developers

AFFORDABLE HOUSING, BUT DIFFERENT TO THIS...

Public housing

We need to defend the state's direct provision of affordable housing

Community Land Trusts

Similar to our final stage but requires philanthropy

Community Housing

NFP housing providers, including community-led housing (e.g. Aboriginal Housing Victoria) and means tested rental co-operatives (e.g. CEHL)


Lobbying government

- Rental price fix
- Stronger tenant protections
- Restriction on short-term holiday rentals
- Increasing public and community housing

MOVING HOUSING OUT OF PRIVATE HANDS

This isn't new

- eg 60% of residents of Vienna live in public housing
- CLTs, coops and communes have been doing this in Australia for decades



Transition to Stewardship A legal/financial model to get out of the market

- Suits a group with a mix of capital and income, leveraging the privilege of those who have some money
- Assumes that people initially want some housing security within the existing financial system
- Slowly shifts housing security to secure and affordable access to collectively stewarded housing

THREE STREAMS, OVERLAPPING

Bank Mortgage Stream Transitional Equity Stream Community Stewardship Stream Payment structure gets proportionally more values-aligned

BANK MORTGAGE STREAM

We have to pay off the mortgage

- Regular payments are a proportion of the mortgage & costs
- No proceeding to other streams until costs drop below affordability threshold

Earn Transitional Equity for every dollar of principal

Eg, in year one earn about 1 dollar in 5 as transitional equity

 After our regular payments, any extra dollar earns \$1 of transitional equity

WHAT IS TRANSITIONAL EQUITY?

It's a safety net while we are not fully community owned

- Use it to pay your housing costs during financial hardship
- Use it to rent elsewhere if we don't have a room free

It's an exit strategy, making it less scary to get involved

- A way to cash out (if it turns out not to suit you) and keep most of what you put in
- Continue building savings while participating in the scheme
- Backed by real assets (property values and cash)

WHAT TRANSITIONAL EQUITY ISN'T

It's not an investment or speculation in housing

- It doesn't rise with inflation
- It doesn't rise with property values
- It does fall with property value reduction
- It doesn't earn interest having money doesn't make more money
- Possessing it doesn't make your housing free

It's TRANSITIONAL, eventually giving way to community

- It has negative interest (eg, 2%), slowly giving value to the collective
- Once the mortgages are paid off, the collective will start buying it off you
- Not a multi-generational store of wealth (ideally not inheritable)

TRANSITIONAL EQUITY STREAM

The bank is sorted, we have some breathing space towards stewardship

Reduce debts, move

- Regular payments are a proportion of the mortgage & costs
- No proceeding to other streams until costs drop below affordability threshold
- Pay remaining debts, continue expansion if necessary, and buy-back transitional equity

COMMUNITY STEWARDSHIP STREAM

We can now be radically affordable

- Life changing housing affordability, say 15% of income
- Good support for retirement, illness, etc

No owners or bank to prevent housing justice

- Participate in evolving approach to Land Back
- Small surplus to support other housing projects (or continue to grow then subdivide)

BLENDING THE STREAMS

Easing ourselves into the idea that security doesn't come from personal ownership





Living collectively

Unlocks cost savings, as well as potential co-living benefits

- Lowering consumption
- Reducing waste
- Combating isolation



Requires relational effort

- Collaborating across differences
- Participating in decision-making
- Navigating conflicts well

Co-Created Project

A context-specific implementation of RAD Housing goals (as a practice in *commoning* rather than as a fixed vision of a specific living situation)

Shared RAD Goals

Collectivise resources and live together in secure, resilient, and affordable housing

Relational Effort

Decision-making participation Navigating conflict well Creating distributed networks of care etc..

Emergent Group

Emerges as people show-up to build the relationships and processes needed to support the project's goals

Project - Group Balance

Sustainable stewardship of a commons requires participation in the emergent collective actions of commoning

COMMONING



Sustainable stewardship of commons requires participation in the emergent collective actions of commoning Participating in commoning can be an uncertain and uncomfortable experience. It can be tempting to freeze a moment-in-time or rigidly pursue a singular future vision, which aborts the commoning process. To remain open to continual commoning, it is crucial to actively engage with the changing

power-dynamics and range of perspectives that are co-creating a given space.

SWARMING ON A FIRST HOUSE

Our first house doesn't have to be a "forever home" for any of us.



During Retrofit

4-5 residents

Residents able to participate in RETROFITTING the house, even if not necessarily living in it once finished

Established property

6–8 residents

Residents wanting to participate in MAINTAINING the property (gardens, etc), while other residents focus on retrofitting the next house

MULTI-HOUSE COLLECTIVES

Established house residents form around co-living compatibilities





8 residents Property is wheelchair accessible and residents focus on growing vegetables for a local food resilience network



5 residents Residents focus on balancing solo and collective practices by prioritising personal spaces and hosting regular gatherings



8 residents Residents practice integrating Indigenous knowledges into (including kids) their focus on living in a multi-generational community



6 residents Residents collectively organise the day-to-day care provided by a local support-worker-cooperative

In Solidarity

"Transformative solidarity is based on the commitment to... changing not just structures, but ourselves."

Transformative solidarity does not simply emerge from common interests. It requires:

- A deep, enduring **commitment** to **justice**
- Acknowledging our **partial perspectives**
- Acting with **courage**, **curiosity**, and **humility**
- Doing the relational work of connecting across differences
- Recognising that our liberation is dependent on liberation for all

... with the First Nation peoples on whose land we live

A phrase attributed to Lilla Watson, that was collectively articulated within a 1970s Aboriginal rights group

... with refugees and people disproportionately at risk of displacement due to the climate crisis

Example actions

Cap our emissions at levels proposed by nations on the front line of climate change rather than those agreed by COP

Designing for the emergency housing we increasingly need for displaced people seeking refuge



- "...the effects of climate change can interact with other drivers of displacement or can disproportionately impact certain groups." https://www.racs.org.au/news/climate-refugees
- "...this is not a crisis of numbers; it is a crisis of solidarity...

 We can afford to help, and we know what we need to do to handle large movements of refugees and migrants" UN report on Refugees and Migrants



... with people experiencing housing stress



Example actions

Showing up to defend against government evictions of public housing residents

Agree in advance how a group intends to participate in debtors strikes and other organised resistance

Prioritise wheelchair accessibility during retrofit designs



...with workers seeking to build transformative power through self-determined labour

Collaborate with a unionised building cooperative on the housing retrofits



Source our energy infrastructure and supply from unionised cooperatives












""Solidarity does not magically emerge as a result of our interdependence – it depends on our ability to describe what bonds us, who we are, what has value, and how we should live together"

Prioritising solidarity is a crucial element of RAD housing



If we lived in a just world where -

First Nations sovereignty was honoured;

A just global and urgent response to climate change;

Housing was available to all; and, where self-determined labour was directed for people not profit

- then RAD housing wouldn't be needed in the first place! Retrofit and Decommodify housing Collectively, and in Solidarity
